Erasmus + ín Konya, Turkey

In February, the language teachers from Pribinka travelled to Konya, Türkiye to take part in Erasmus+ project called European Games. I interviewed Ms. Marianna Vavrová, an English teacher, to get more information on what our teachers experienced during their stay.

Alexander: At which hour was the planned arrival and did you come in time?

Ms.Vavrová: We woke up early in the morning to get first to Vienna. Our flight was scheduled to 7 o'clock in the morning, so, we were leaving Zlaté Moravce at about 3 am. From Vienna we flew to Istanbul. The flight took 2 hours. Then we had to change the plane in Istanbul. Actually, because of the severe earthquake that hit the southern part of Türkiye, the flights were cancelled. Instead of waiting for the plane to Konya for 6 hours, we waited 3 more hours.

Alexander: What was the weather like when you arrived?

Ms.Vavrová: In comparison with Slovakia, the weather was lovely. It was very cold, temperature was below zero, there were piles of snow lying next to the sidewalk and the sun was shining.

How would you say were the Turkish people?

Ms.**Vavrová**: We found Turkish people really friendly and polite. They showed us round, accompanied us and prepared wonderful activities for us.

Alexander: Was there anything that surprised you about them?

Ms.Vavrová: In fact, I had always thought that Turkish men were more dominant than women. But Turkish women say that they rule the family \bigcirc .

Alexander: *Have you learned any facts about their religion? Did they somehow explain it?*

Ms.Vavrová: Turkish people are Muslims and their religion is Islam. Many people are deep believers and they prey 5 times per day. They go to mosques to prey to Allah. Women cover their hair with scarves to protect themselves from the bad views of men.

Alexander: Were the students studying at school or did they have online classes?

Ms.Vavrová: You are right, children were at home that week we were visiting Turkish partner school. They were at home because of devastating earthquake that hit the southern part of the country. There were many casualties and many families with children were moving out of the area and coming to Konya. They needed help, they needed shelter, they needed help, they needed shelter, they needed food and clothes. Therefore, schools were closed. However, we could feel how people helped one another.

Alexander: Did you have any time to buy souvenirs for yourself and were the merchants pushy when you were visiting local stores and restaurants?

Ms.Vavrová: Oh, yes, I bought some sweets and a scarf (LOL o). I cannot say the traders were pushy...They were just very polite.




Level 1
